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Watch for **Power Lines** It May Save Your Life



Power Line Safety at Work and Home

Between 2011 and 2017, 36% of all electrically-related workplace fatalities were caused by overhead power lines. In the majority of these cases, fatalities occurred in occupations with little to no electrical safety training. So when you're on a job site, remember to always look up, always – it can save your life.

If a vehicle or object contacts a power line or utility pole:

- Consider all lines to be live and dangerous.
- Tell other not to approach vehicle, downed lines, or anything that may be in contact with downed lines.
- Warn others to stay at least 35 feet away.
- Stay in place or inside your vehicle unless you see fire or smoke.
- Call 911.
- Always use lock out tag out procedures when working on any equipment with electrical energy, or other hazardous energies such as mechanical, hydraulic, pneumatic,

lines are located, and know where they are hanging or buried. Whether you're working on the roof, trimming trees, putting in a new mailbox, or painting your siding, it's your job to be aware and to alert others about nearby power lines, both above and underground.

- Locate all overhead power lines.
- Stay at least 10 feet away from all overhead power lines.
- Do not touch anything in contact with power lines.
- Carry ladders and equipment horizontally.
- Stay at least 35 feet away from downed power lines. Call 911 if you encounter one.
- Be aware of underground utilities. Know what's below – make a phone call to 811 before you dig. Homeowners often make risky assumptions about whether or not they should get their utility lines marked, but every digging job requires a call – even seemingly small projects like planting trees and shrubs.

In the event of fire or smoke:

- Do not touch the ground and vehicle at the same time
- Jump from the vehicle with your feet together.
- Shuffle away and avoid lifting your feet.
